
Message from the Secretary

Welcome to this special edition of the RTBU Express, a commemoration of the 100th Anniversary of The Great Strike. It was one of the largest industrial actions Australia has ever seen, and began when rail and tramway workers in Eveleigh and Randwick downed tools against new working conditions. Today, our unions carry the torch for the brave men and women who went on strike in 1917.

Close to 100,000 workers went on strike for 6 weeks, cultivating the protest and support of over 200,000 Australians.

Over one third of union members in NSW - 14% of the total workforce in NSW - took part, as well as thousands of workers in Victoria and Queensland. The retribution of governments and employers against those unions and their members was calculated and severe.

The 1917 Great Strike is a moment in history that we should continue to reflect on and learn from.



A message from Sally McManus



"The Government of the day, the ruling class and the press they owned tried to destroy us. But despite owning the media that attacked and vilified the unions, despite all the forces available to the state being mobilised against them, despite the blacklisting of the lilywhite strikers, despite the deregistering of so many unions – they did not crush or destroy us.

They made us stronger.

They wanted to punish a generation of unionists so severely we would want to forget this strike. Yet 100 years on, we are here today, five generations on celebrating it."

Ben Chifley



Chifley was the youngest locomotive driver in the NSW Railways and went on to become Australia's 16th Prime Minister.

During his lifetime Chifley referred to the Strike as a pivotal moment in Australian history, for him personally and for Australian workers.

"All that that harsh and oppressive treatment did...was to transform me...from an ordinary engine driver into the Prime Minister of this country"

Seeking Justice for Merv



Merv Flanagan, a member of the Trolley Draymen and Carter's Union, was shot and killed by a scab on Pyrmont Bridge Road on the 30th August. The justice system failed to deliver justice for Merv. The Coroner's Court dismissed the charge against the scab whoshot and killed Merv, instead, jailing his brother and a mate for two months.

Merv's death left a young widow and a large family without the support of their breadwinner. Although Merv was not the first worker to be killed in the course of a strike, nor the last, he remains especially

remembered as a victim of the 1917 Great Strike. Please help us in our appeal to give Merv a headstone and memorial that he deserves by donating here.
