Mind the gap. Minister's new, dodgy trains a safety disaster

The safety of Blue Mountains train commuters will be put at real risk by the NSW Transport Minister's ridiculous decision to purchase trains that don't fit on the current tracks. Reports released in August reveal that stretches of track in the Blue Mountains will have to be shifted or replaced and stations and overhead wires altered to make the line between Springwood and Lithgow suitable for the new fleet of intercity trains.

Rail, Tram and Bus Union Secretary, Alex Claassens, said one major concern – among many – is the fact that the changes to stations will mean the gap between the platform and the current fleet of trains will be incredibly wide and hazardous. "This is a bungle of epic proportions," Mr Claassens said. "Unfortunately this is just the latest example of the Transport Minister thinking more about profits than the needs and safety of the community." Read more on RTBU Express online.

It was a very significant conference for the trade union movement, with the Leader of the Opposition, Luke Foley, announcing a five-point plan to tackle worker exploitation and wage theft. Luke put union issues at the centre of Labor's pitch to voters for the next NSW election.

The RTBU has been fighting hard for many of the reforms that Luke announced. Our Union was also at the
